

Amendment Number	Short Description	DPCF Recommendations
1	Adds language requiring voters to be US Citizens	NO. Unnecessary and divisive. All voters already must be US citizens.
2	Raises minimum wage to \$15/hour by 2026	YES. It's a slow increase and may not be enough in 2026 but it's an important step. Current minimum wage is only \$8.56/hour.
3	"Jungle Primaries" (open primaries with top two candidates proceeding to general election)	NO. Supported by major Republican donors, it would further emphasize the role of money in campaigns and minimize the input of voters belonging to minor or no parties. [DPCTB Note: Party affiliation may not be included on primary ballots and top two candidates for general election may be two Republicans].
4	Dual approval for constitutional amendments proposed outside of legislature (i.e., amendments by petition)	NO. After already raising the bar to 60% of the vote for constitutional amendments in Florida, this would add another barrier to voters' voices and significantly raise the cost of ballot initiatives in Florida.
5	Adds a third year to transfer the "Save our Homes" homestead exemption to a new/different home.	NO. Will drain more than \$10M from already cash-strapped municipalities and savings will go to people who are substantially better off already. [DPCTB comments: tax law should not be added to the constitution as it is difficult to change/amend. Takes power away from local municipalities for collecting taxes.]
6	Property Tax discount for spouses of deceased veterans	NO. Does not belong in Florida's constitution. Every election, there are new exceptions put on the ballot by legislature, designed to chip away at our tax base. [DPCTB comments: See DPCTB comments above in Amendment 5].
